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EVENT 28 – PLEASURE DRIVE

Monday 14th June – 9.00 am.

By popular request, this is being held again on **MONDAY morning**. Several people who went last year voted it the highlight of the weekend. Start at the woolshed, approx. 8.45 to 9.00 am leaving from the Blacksmith's Shop area. The course is very picturesque, suitable for a rider, vehicle driver, or a horse and slide. It is approximately seven km to the creek crossing where tea and damper will be served, then return to camp at your leisure, via the creek crossing and back along the Evanslea Road, or else back the way you came, via picturesque Stockyard Feedlot.

This is **not** judged. Please Pre-book/pre-pay so we know how many to cater for, \$2 per person- a great way to wind-up the weekend!

VOLUNTEERS

Volunteer help is needed with various tasks around the complex over the weekend.

If you might be able to help, please contact the committee or the woolshed as soon as possible.

For the competitors' benefit, the woolshed puts on a Friday night dinner- expressions of interest for numbers requiring this must be completed on the entry forms.

CONDITIONS OF ENTRY

GENERAL: Each competitor shall not hold the Jondaryan Woolshed Open Air Working Museum, nor any of its officers, servants or assistants responsible for anything that may happen from any cause or circumstances whatever to competitors, their servants, the public or any spectator or through to any animal, vehicle or implement or equipment present at the Working Draught Horse Expo, and each competitor shall indemnify the "Association" against any legal proceedings arising from any such cause or circumstances.

The organisers reserve the right to alter the timetabling to better suit entries if deemed necessary.

ENTRY FORMS: All entries for the Working Draught Horse Expo shall be pre-nominated and be received by the Secretary on the correct form with the correct entry fees **on or before Friday 14h May. Late entries may be accepted, but the entry fee incurs a 100% surcharge after the closing date.**

ENTRY FEES: The entry fee is **\$6.00 (including GST) per entry per class.** Entry fees must accompany the entry form. A TAX INVOICE/RECEIPT will be issued to all competitors for the total of entry and other fees.

PRIZE MONEY: Prize money (EXCLUDING GST) for all events, unless noted otherwise (eg Junior Handler events) , shall be:

1st – \$30.00 2nd – \$20.00 3rd – \$10.00 4th – \$5.00

or goods to that value as supplied by sponsors .

GST: GST will be added to Prize Money ONLY if:

– competitors are registered for GST and have supplied their ABN on the entry form.

–Total Prize Monies per entrant exceed \$50.

A recipient created Tax Invoice will be supplied by the Council with Prize Money to competitors who are registered for GST purposes.

RIBBONS & TROPHIES: Ribbons will be awarded to 4th place except where the Judge may award a lesser ribbon or no ribbon in classes where the entry does not in the Judge's opinion meet the expected standard. Where stated, all Junior competitors will receive a ribbon. Trophies will be awarded as listed in the Program of events.



17th **WORKING DRAUGHT HORSE EXPO**

AGE OF HORSES: The age of all horses will be computed from August 1st, ie foals under one have been born since midnight 1/8/09; over one and under two born between 1/8/08 and 30/7/09.

JUNIOR DRIVERS/HANDLERS are children aged between **5 and 17 years** on the day of competition. They must be accompanied by an adult while competing. Their classes have **no entry fee** this year, and no prizemoney, but ribbons will be awarded as well as some tangible prizes.
A number of new classes have been added -see further ahead.

HORSE ACCOMMODATION: All stallions will be allocated a special stall if required and paid for. There will be an extra charge for these. Outdoor stalls will be allocated to those who pre-book **ONLY**, and will be marked with names. See entry forms for costs. (No undercover stalls are available.) You are expected to book stalls if you require them.

COMPETITOR ENTRY PASSES: Gate Passes will be issued on the basis of **two** passes per horse entered, with a maximum of six per exhibitor. All others entering with competitors will be required to pay a combined camping/entry fee of \$20.00 per adult, or \$10.00 per primary-school child for the full long-weekend.

COMPETITOR ACCOMMODATION: Camping sites are available adjacent to the Shearers Quarters at the Jondaryan Woolshed and in the Creek Paddock where the horses are yarded.

Big open fires are **not** permitted in the camping area. **Responsible contained fires are OK, (BYO firewood please)**

No horses are to be **brought** into in the **Quarters** camping area. A separate area for yards is provided. This is in line with current Department of Environment and Heritage and also Workplace Health & Safety guidelines.

NON COMPETITIVE CAMPERS: Camping sites are available for the full weekend at \$20 per adult, or \$10 per primary-school child for anyone not specifically competing. We ask you to please be honest with us in this regard as we are trying to run an event for the competitors as well as for the public.

DOGS: The Woolshed's new legal standing is that **NO dogs** are to be allowed upon the campsite or woolshed grounds at all. (Only the woolshed's working dogs are exempt from this regulation.)

SPRAYING OF HORSES: Jondaryan is a Cattle Tick free area, therefore all stock travelling from east of the tick line or 'ticky' areas to the Jondaryan Woolshed **must** comply with current DPI guidelines re tick treatment.

TIMELINESS: Unless otherwise noted at the beginning of the class,





competitors may be disqualified if not ready five minutes prior to the timetabled start of their class.

PRESENTATION: Since this is a show for the benefit of the competitors and the public and the Woolshed, the cleanliness and presentation of your horses is important to you and to us. Concreted washing-bay facilities have been provided next to the Sulky Shed near the Blacksmith's Shop, and at the Hay Shed up at the North end of the Complex. A temporary wash area on crusher-dust is located near the bottom end of the competitors' yards area.

MULTIPLE ENTRIES IN CLASSES: No horse and handler combination may enter or compete more than once in any working class. Any one horse may only be used once in any one class by any one competitor. (i.e four horses required for two pairs; three horses cannot be used to make two pairs.) No competitor may enter more than twice in any one class. No horse may complete any course more than twice (eg husband, and later the wife or a partner driving), except for the Junior classes, where a horse may be used by maximum of four children from the one family, but no child may compete more than once in any class.

UNATTENDED HORSES: No horse/s, harnessed to a vehicle, implement or slide, are to be tied up and left unattended whilst harnessed to that vehicle or implement. If you must tie horses in harness to a truck/rail/etc and leave them unattended for whatever reason, disconnect the traces etc from the vehicle/implement first.

OTHER BREEDS: The Association would be willing to consider including led classes for other draught breeds if requested by the relevant societies.

NEW EVENTS: Read the programme carefully: this year some events have been moved to a different timeslot, or a different day, and some rules may have changed. The Monday Pleasure Drive, Billy Tea & Damper is a popular 'goer'!

OBSTACLE COURSES: Rules other than as listed beside each class, will be posted at the Secretary's Office on the weekend. Course descriptions/maps where required will be posted at the Office also. No individual maps will be given out. This applies to Log Snigging, Slide courses, Cart/Dray course, Marathon Obstacles.

EXTENSION LEADS: *To comply with new Workplace Health & Safety rules, All leads used must have a current safety tag, The only exception is if a competitor has their own Earth-Leakage Circuit Breaker (ELCB).*

HORSE ENTRY NUMBERS: are allocated so that Judges, Stewards and the Public can identify competitors and horses. Horses **MUST** display their numbers when competing and **PLEASE return numbers to the Secretary at the completion**



of the weekend, or you will be required to **reimburse** the woolshed for replacements for the following year's event.

FOOTWEAR - appropriate footwear must be worn when handling horses.

DEFINITIONS

A PONY is any horse **NOT EXCEEDING 14 hands** high.

A LIGHT HORSE is any hack/sulky type horse of predominantly 'light' horse breeding, over 14 Hands high. A 1/2" shoe allowance will be subtracted.

A MEDIUM-WEIGHT DRAUGHT HORSE is one of a lighter type of heavy horse, or a heavy/light cross that is predominantly heavy rather than light, or a part-bred heavy horse.

A HEAVY HORSE is just that- either a pure bred Clydesdale/ Shire/Percheron/etc, or a part-bred horse of a heavier type than 'Medium' as listed above.

THE JUDGES decision is final, and though it is up to the competitors to categorise their own horses, the Judge may instruct competitors to compete in an alternate Pony/Light/Medium/Heavy class if the Judge feels the horse/s have been wrongly entered. A 1/2" shoe-allowance will be subtracted.

SOUNDNESS: The Judge may disqualify any entry that he feels has unsound horse, harness, implement or vehicle on the grounds of safety or otherwise.

BREED DISPLAYS: We encourage the different breed societies to set-up a display promoting their respective favourite horses. As well as those featuring in Led-in classes, we will have Hafingers, Gypsy Cobs and the Clydesdale Cross Sport Horse Association expressing interest in taking part this weekend.

EVENT 1 – REGISTERED PERCHERONS

RULE: Only those horses included in the Percheron Society Stud Book (and Pending Registrations) are eligible to enter. Marshalling is in the sheep yards outside the woolshed.

- Class. 1. Gelding any age
2. Foal under 12 months
3. Colt or stallion over 1 year of age
4. Filly 1 and 2 years old
5. Mare 3 and over
6. Mare 5 years and over.

Champion & Reserve Percheron (geldings eligible)

7. Appendix Registered Percheron having
50% or more Percheron blood.



EVENT 2– REGISTERED CLYDESDALES

RULE: Only those horses included in the Commonwealth Clydesdale Horse Society Stud Book are eligible to enter. (Pending registrations are also allowed).
Marshalling will be in the sheep yards outside the woolshed.

Class. 1. Gelding 3 years and under.

2 Gelding 4 and over.

(Cl.1&2 will be combined if fewer than three entries in either class)

Champion & Reserve Champion Gelding (From Cl. 1 & 2).

3. Colt under 12 months

4. Filly under 12 months

EVENT 3 – LED DRAUGHT HORSES

RULE: Any horses entered in Led Clydesdale, Percheron or Other Registered Heavy Horse Breed classes are not eligible to enter this event.

Class. 1. Gelding 3 years and under.

2. Gelding 4 and over.

Champion & Reserve Champion Gelding (From Cl. 1 & 2).

3. Colt under 12 months

4. Filly under 12 months

(Cl. 3&4 will be combined if total entries are fewer than 5)

5. Colt or stallion over 1 year

6. Filly 1 and 2 years old

Champion & Reserve Stallion or Colt (from Cl. 3&5).

Junior Champion & Reserve Junior Champion Filly (from Cl. 4&6).

Trophy – Junior Champion Filly donated by Barry Muller, Dalby.

7. Mare 3 and 4 years old.

8. Mare 5 years and over.

(Cl. 7&8 will be combined if fewer than three entries in either class)

Champion & Reserve Champion Mare (from Cl. 7&8).

Perpetual Trophy – Champion Draught Mare donated by Peter and Kim Brennan, Bobcat Hire, Crow's Nest.

Supreme Champion Draught Horse (from the four Champions above, geldings excluded)

EVENT 4 – SHIRE HORSES

RULE: Open to those horses included in the Stud Book (and pending registrations) and upgrades where allowed

Class 1. Foal under 12 months.

2. Stallion, Colt any age.

3. Mare or Filly, any age.

4.

Gelding, any age

Champion & Reserve Champion Shire Horse





EVENT 5 – LIGHT HORSE SHOW DRIVING CLASSES

RULE : Conducted under Australian Driving Society guidelines.

Competitors must bring their own wheeled vehicle. Slides or Agricultural Implements are not allowed in these classes.

Pony/donkey/horse classes may be combined if fewer than three entries are received in either class.

'Horse' classes, or 'harness' classes, are judged solely on the horse/s and their workout.

'Turnout' classes i.e. 1, 2, 9 are judged:

Horse:	50 points,
Vehicle:	30 points,
Harness:	10 points,
General Appearance:	10 points.

'Driver' or 'whip' classes, i.e. 12,13,14, are judged on the Driver and their ability, control, driving stance and correctness. The equine and vehicle are not considered.

Junior Drivers , whilst driving,-are to be accompanied all times by an adult groom with driving experience.

1. Turnout – Pony equine single, multiple - viceroys and traditional vehicles.
2. Turnout – Pony equine single, multiple – modern steel wheel vehicle – joggers.
3. Pony equine in harness single, multiple under 12-2
4. Pony equine in harness single, multiple 12-2 – under 14-00
5. Pleasure pony equine in harness single, multiple under 14-00

CHAMPION - RESERVE CHAMPION Pony Equine. (classes 3-5)

6. Turnout Light Horse single, multiple viceroys and traditional vehicles 14-00 over
7. Turnout Light Horse single, multiple, modern steel wheel vehicle – joggers
8. Light Horse single, multiple, in harness 14-00 over
9. Pleasure light horse single, multiple in harness.

CHAMPION - RESERVE CHAMPION Horse (classes 8-9)

10. Junior Driver
11. Lady Whip
12. Gentleman Whip





EVENT 6 – PLOUGHING COMPETITION

RULE: (for mouldboard ploughs only.) Please note rule concerning multiple entries on page 7. N.B.the committee will ensure that THE GROUND WILL HAVE BEEN WORKED OVER BY TRACTOR APPROXIMATELY SIX WEEKS BEFORE THE EVENT. It is typical Darling Downs blacksoil.

Competitors may plough as time allows should a clash of events occur. This is at the Judge's discretion, and the Stewards and Judge should be consulted beforehand by the competitor requesting the delay.

Jondaryan Committee Ploughing Rules. Plots will be assigned randomly by the Judge/Stewards/ Committee beforehand. The start and end of each Crown to be ploughed will be pegged. Competitors may bring and use no more than one extra peg for sighting purposes. The strikeout depth will be as set by the judge . The finished plot to show eight furrows, four on either side of the crown. (Four furrows make up the crown). All soil to be turned over. **Competitors may then be asked to plough more than eight rounds to complete a wider plot for the judge's and audience's benefit.**

Handlers are allowed 'in an emergency only' once ploughing has commenced. The same combination of horse/s, plough and driver may only compete once in each class.

Competitors must organise or bring their own plough.

Mum & Dad Ploughing – a new class with prizemoney and a trophy will be awarded for the most authentic-looking period costume. This will be judged during this ploughing, and costs no more to enter.

NOTE WELL: SOIL TYPE & CONDITION – . If possible, **unploughed cultivation/stubble** in blacksoil will be used, with each competitor being assigned a **totally separate plot**. If soil circumstances are such that that is not possible, other arrangements will be made.

- Class 1. Single Horse, Mouldboard Plough.
- 2a. Mum & Dad Ploughing (single or pairs), Mouldboard. Any one **couple** can only enter once.
- 2b. Junior Ploughing (single or pair of horses & mouldboard plough)
Entrants aged up to 21 years old, prizemoney and trophy kindly sponsored by Brian Carter

NOTE: For all other Ploughing classes, see Event No. 18 on Sunday.





EVENT 7 – AGRICULTURAL IMPLEMENTS TURNOUT

RULE: Work–out at the Judges discretion. As a Turnout, the criteria are horse/s, harness, implement and general appearance/appropriateness.

- Class 1. Single Horse & Implement.
2. Pairs or Team of three or more.

EVENT 8 – AUTHENTIC PERIOD TURNOUT

RULES: Open to all breeds, heavy and light, and any combination, singles or multiples in a wheeled vehicle. Judged on authenticity of the turnout and the following scale:

- Costume: 25 points
Vehicle: 25 points
Horse: 25 points
Harness: 15 points
Appearance: 10 points

EVENT 9 – SLIDE OBSTACLE COURSE

GENERAL RULES: Each horse and handler combination may only enter once. (Please note the rules for multiple entries in the front of this booklet). Competitors may compete in the single horse and Junior class as time allows in case of a clash of entries. Consult with the Secretary and Judge beforehand. Two slides will be used, to eliminate time wasting changeovers of horses. **Competitors will be expected to ready to enter the course as the previous competitor finishes.**

SPECIFIC RULES :Touching a marker incurs a fault. Knocking a marker completely over incurs 5 faults. An average course time limit will be supplied, beyond which time penalties will apply. This course is judged such that the competitor with the fewest faults is the winner. In the event of a tie, the faster timed competitor shall be the winner.

- Class 1. Pair of Horses (In Slide Arena, Area 3)
2. Mum & Dad Novelty Slide (In Show Arena, Area 1)

NOTE – For Single Horse Class, see Event 17 on Sunday.





EVENT 10 - TAG TEAM

A completely new event!

Equipment needed: 4 people, 1 heavy horse, winkers, collars and hames, backband and chains

The collar and hames are to be separated ie. the hames are not to be sitting on the collar, and the backband must be removed from the chains before the start of the event. Two teams go at a time to run off against each other.

The holder will hold the horse 25 metres from the start. Runner 1 runs to horse and puts on the winkers then runs back to the start line and tags runner 2 who has the collar and hames. Once the collar and hames are on the horse runner 2 runs back and tags runner3 who has the backband and chains. The chains must be hooked to the collar and the hooks placed in the ring of the backband and the backband attached the chains before runner3 can tag runner 1 who has the reins. Once the reins are on the bit the holder lets the horse go and runner 1 drives the horse back to the start. **NO TROTTING PERMITTED.**

Event can be timed in case of equality of points and if harness not correctly fitted then time is added to the final time. Points will be lost or time added for straps not in keepers or buckles, hames not tight or correctly fitting and backband must be in the same links on both chains.

Safety must be paramount at all times

EVENT 11 – BUSINESS, DELIVERY or TRADESMAN’S TURNOUTS

RULES: Generally as per Light Horse Show Driving Classes rules as pertaining to points and judging (see event 5). Work-out at judges request.

- Class 1. Team of Three or more Horses in Harness.
2. Pair of Medium or Heavy Delivery Horses in Harness
3. DELIVERY TURNOUT for a pair of medium or heavy horses

(note the following classes are on Sunday, following the Period Turnout:)

4. Medium and 1/2 Draught in Harness
5. Heavy Horse in Harness

Champion & Res. Single Medium or Heavy Horse in Harness
(From Classes 4 & 5 above)

6. Medium & Heavy Horse DELIVERY TURNOUT
7. LADY DRIVER with any single Medium or Heavy horse
in a wheeled vehicle.

(Note- for Junior Drivers, see Event 5 class 10)





EVENT 12 – BARREL RACE

RULES: Instant elimination if barrel is knocked over. Horses in a wheeled vehicle may trot. 5-second penalty and a warning for first break of gait into a canter. Elimination upon second break of gait.

Class 1. Barrel Race for any Medium or Heavy Horse in a wheeled vehicle, with two or four wheels.

EVENT 13 - Bush Shindig **SATURDAY NIGHT FROM 6.30 PM**

in the famous Jondaryan Woolshed

Competitors' 'Bush Shindig' evening in the woolshed- informal entertainment amongst each other, and impromptu acts- suggestions and volunteers invited and required! Free entry/admittance for all! No gate charges. Show us your talents or specialties- music, singing, poetry, comedy, whatever!

Bar & BBQ available at the woolshed.

EVENT 14 – LOG SNIGGING OBSTACLE COURSES

RULES: General Rules as per slide obstacle course (event 9) Competitors may compete as time allows where a clash of events occurs. Consult with the Secretary and Judge beforehand.

SPECIFIC RULES: Two sets of logs and two identical courses will be used to help save time. Competitors will be expected to be ready to enter the course as the previous competitor finishes their run. These are a "fewest faults" events, but the competitor's workout will be timed, the times being used to separate tied scores. The horse having the fewest faults in the shortest time is the winner. A maximum time limit allowed on the course may be set by the judge.

Logs may be of different weights, but competitors may select either the heavier or lighter set.

Points are incurred for each of horse, driver, logs or swinglebar touching outer line or dislodging a ball from a cone or if outside assistance is required. (Note a ball has to be dislodged from a cone to incur a fault). Instant disqualification if a driver continues the course with horse's legs outside the chains.

A serpentine course is to be travelled in a 7 x 14 metre box with three cones at 4,3,3,4 metre spacings. No trace chains to be shorter than 2.25 metres long (7'6"). Trace chains to





Pairs will have three logs and a larger course: 7.5m x 22 metres, with three cones placed at 6,5,5,6 metre spaces from the starting line.

Teams will be as per pairs but a wider course: 8.5 metres x 28 metres, with cones at 7,7,7,7 metre spacings. Start where indicated by the judge.

- Class
1. Single horse
 2. Pair of horses
 3. Team of three

EVENT 15 – COMPETITION DRIVING & NOVELTY CLASSES

RULES: Conducted under the Jondaryan Committee Rules, (a somewhat modified version of what was once A.D.S. rules. It is advisable to wear a safety helmet in all sporting events. Vehicles for all entries in event 15 classes must seat both driver and groom- ponies under **12 hh** do not have to have a seated groom but must have groom in attendance at all times. No motorised vehicles will be allowed on the event ground at anytime except electric scooters and official vehicles. (A wheeled vehicle is required)

Class 1. Cone Driving for junior drivers (must have an adult groom at all times)

2. Cone Driving for equine single, multiple under 12.2 hh
3. Cone Driving for equine single, multiple 12.2 - 14.0 hh
4. Cone Driving for single, multiple light horse 14.0 hh & over
5. Long Rein cone course - equine pony- single, multiple
6. Long Rein cone course - light horse- single, multiple
7. Handy Horse - any light equine, any height, single or multiple
8. Diamond Flag - any light equine, any height, single or multiple
9. Keyhole - any light equine, any height, single or multiple
10. Driver - Groom "Surprise" – any light equine etc as above
11. Obstacle Driving - Junior Driver
12. Obstacle Driving for equine pony, single or multiple
13. Obstacle Driving for light horse 14.0 HH & over, single/multiple

Note- classes above may be combined if fewer than three entries

14. **Obstacle Course for Single Medium to Heavy Horse.** Horses from class 13 above are ineligible.

15. **Obstacle Course for Medium to Heavy Pairs.** To be contested at a walking pace, faults and times to be noted. The above course (modified) to be used. Horses from class 13 above are ineligible.

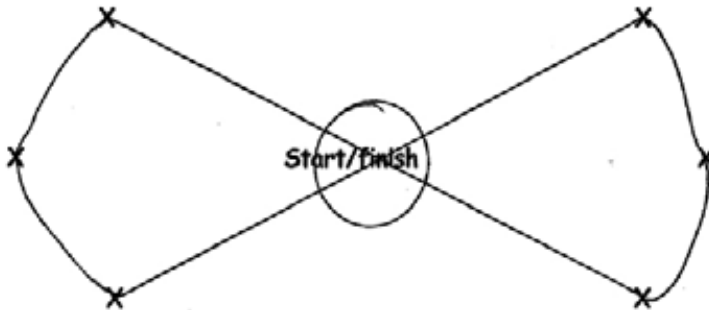




EVENT 16 – SCOOP RACE

Requirements: 2 people & one horse

(Scoop & swinglebar will be supplied)



Driver must drive horse in a figure eight, from start to finish.
Scoop person to scoop up all tennis balls and then to be dumped into the circle at finish.

Rules:

- ⇒ NO Trotting
- ⇒ Balls to be scooped up by scoop only.
- ⇒ No hand handling of balls.
- x=balls

EVENT 17 – SINGLE HORSE SLIDE OBSTACLE COURSE

NOTE: See Event 9 on Saturday for General and Specific Rules for this class.
complete as time allows for classes 1 & 2.

Class 1. Single Horse. *Trophy donated by Malken Clydesdales.*

EVENT 18 – PAIRS PLOUGHING COMPETITION

RULES: See Event 6 on Saturday, the Single Ploughing for general rules.
'Ploughing the split' class must turn in an anticlockwise direction at each end, beginning with the outer edges of the plot, and ploughing in to leave one final parallel furrow as a trench in the centre of the plot. The judge may or may not





assign further instructions or limit the number of furrows allowed.

- Class. 1. Mouldboard Ploughing with a **Pair** of Horses .
(if three or more women enter specifically in this class,
a separate Ladies Pair class will be held)
- 2 Ploughing the Split (between gathered plots).
Pair of horses with a mouldboard plough.

EVENT 19 – SPRING CART OBSTACLE COURSE

OBSTACLE COURSE for Medium or Heavy Horse in a traditional Spring Cart or Dray. (Only 'standard sized' Spring carts allowed.) Compete in the 'Cones' arena. *A fault-free round in the fastest time decides the winner but cantering incurs instant disqualification.*

EVENT 20 - PLAIT, PRESENT & PARADE YOUR HORSE

Competitors are to bring an undecorated horse up, and will have 40 minutes in which to plait and decorate the mane and tail in a traditional manner for that type of horse and then parade their work before the judge. A helper is allowed to hold the horse only, or to give hints, and may not help physically with any plaiting, tying, knotting or decorating. A plaiting stool or stand of some type would be essential. Two classes- 1. Open, and 2. Junior (under 17).

EVENT 21– OMEGA FEED BEGINNER and JUNIOR HANDLER CLASSES

RULES: no entry fee, but you **MUST** pre-enter. Ribbons and prizes but not prize money will be awarded. Open to competitors aged from 5 to 17years of age on the first day of the Expo. (Proof of age may be required.) An adult **must** accompany smaller children during this class. Any breed (light or heavy) may be exhibited in the led-in section. It is not necessary for every child to enter in every event

Class 1. Led-in horse and handler

To be judged on the handler's ability to control, present, and show a horse in a halter, plus the presentation of the handler. The horse's conformation is **not** to be taken into account.

Please note the rules at the front re multiple use of horses, and since all entrants will receive a ribbon, no entries will be taken on the day. All children must be

familiar with the horse they are to handle beforehand.

Class 2. Long Reined obstacle course

Class 3. Harnessing a horse to a slide

Class 4. Slide obstacle course.

Class 5. Ridden Heavy Horse obstacle course.

(Note- see Event 20, class 2 for Junior Plaiting & Decorating)

EVENT 22 – HARNESSING A HORSE TO A SLIDE

NOTE: This class is now only for competitors who have not previously won a first place in this event and who have had less than eight years' experience with heavy horses.

RULES: This is to be judged on the handler's speed, efficiency, correctness of fit and safety. Competitors must harness their horse, attach the slide, load the slide then drive the horse at a WALK for 20 metres. An assistant may be used to hold the horses head while harnessing and hooking up the slide.

This is a timed event, and a 5 second penalty will apply for every piece of incorrectly fitted harness or other mistake, at the Judge's discretion.

(Note, see above for the Junior Handler event - Ev.21 cl.3)

Class 1. (open)

EVENT 23 – REAL LOG–SNIGGING OBSTACLE COURSE

This event involves loading a log onto a waggon and/or other practical task as would be required in a real situation, and may involve using a scoop.

Class 1. Single Horse.

The *Ross Breusch Memorial Trophy*, a perpetual trophy, for the winner of the single event above, has been organised and donated by the Qld Clydesdale & Draught Horse Society. This magnificent trophy resides at the woolshed, but the winner receives a memento.

EVENT 24 – DRAUGHT HOBBY– HORSE

This class is for the very young at heart :

Contestants will be required to bring, then ride their Draught Hobby–Horses through an obstacle course. **No entry fee**, no prizemoney, just ribbons for placegetters in each category. (No entries will be taken on the day. Compete





Sunday afternoon)

Judging will be on

1. The Hobby Horse's Quality, (colour, conformation, ingenuity and cuteness).
2. The Presentation of the Rider
3. The Skill of the rider in negotiating the course with as few faults as possible in the quickest time.
4. Any other requirements the judge may have.

(Minimum requirements: one head, one body/stick for the horse.)

Class 1 Rider aged 7 & under

2. Rider aged 8 & over.

(Note a separate prize may be awarded to the best horse MADE by the rider themselves.)

EVENT 25 – BREED DISPLAYS AND TALKS -all weekend-

For individuals or Breed Societies to give a question-and-answer talk, demonstration or display of some of the features of their Breed etc.

and on the points of conformation of the respective breeds.

Entries are requested from interested individuals and/or representatives of breeds so mutually convenient timetabling can be arranged.

The venue is in various places on the complex. (No fee.)

EVENT 26 – HEAVY HORSE UNDER SADDLE

A ridden workout is expected, and must be as directed by the judge. Riding helmets must be worn. 'Heavy' here means medium or heavy.

(Note- Competitors in the *Beginner and Junior Ridden class* (Event 21 class 5) are ineligible for this event.)

- Class
1. Ridden Heavy Horse (like a hack class)- Open to all ages
 2. Ridden Obstacle Course under saddle.-Open to all ages

EVENT 27 – LONG REINING OBSTACLE COURSE

This involved negotiating a medium or heavy horse through a course set by the committee or judge with fewest faults in the shortest time. Compete as time allows.

Class 1. Open to all ages

(except Beginner & Junior competitors from Event 21 class 2)



EVENT 28 – PLEASURE DRIVE - Monday morning

\$2 per head entry fee-pay with other horse entries- depart 8.45 am from the blacksmith's shop area below the damper room, for a leisurely drive via horse and assorted carriages, slides or under saddle, for a trip out along Evanslea Rd, cross the river, and have a nice tea and damper for a break, then return to the woolshed campsite at around 12.30. BYO horse and vehicle, or pre-arrange to accompany someone with one!

We generally have 25 to 50 people attending this lovely drive.
